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FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Year B — Reflection 7th July 2024

In todays Gospel true to the proverb, we hear that no prophet is honored by their own people, and Jesus is rejected by the people of Nazareth.

Jesus was back and wanted to share his gifts with his people. But instead of being welcomed, he found people watching him, studying him, and scrutinizing him. In effect they were saying 'Who does he think he is?' Why did they take offense at him? They didn't/couldn't/wouldn't believe. The real question was can anything good happen among us?' Jesus accomplished very little in Nazareth.

In 2009, 'Britain's Got Talent,' a woman made her way to the stage and said she wanted to sing like one of Britain's most acclaimed stars. The judges for the contest barely concealed their amusement, and after a few minutes, the audience was whispering their doubts and criticisms.

As Susan Boyle's beautiful voice delivered note after note, the shocked audience stood and applauded. Boyle had been judged unfairly by those who assumed they knew what to expect from her.

Three days after that broadcast, in her Herald Scotland column, Colette Douglas-Home, called Boyle's story a modern parable and a rebuke to the human tendency to judge others based on physical appearances,

Now in the middle of winter 2024, it's easy to focus on signs of dispeter all around us. Today's Cospel suggests

signs of disaster all around us. Today's Gospel suggests when we do so, God is amazed and saddened at our lack of faith.

We aren't called to save the world.

Our call is to be part of the 10% who believe in God and in God's faith in us. If we have the courage to believe, we can be the ones to announce the good news in such a way, others begin to believe.

In the light of the Scripture today, we pledge to create an environment where fear of differences is replaced by encouraging all people to share their gifts. The world often pushes us to compete or conform, but God calls us to a different way: working together, needing each other, being the body of Christ.

May we in all the upheaval and chaos around us learn to act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with the God who works with us towards a new heaven and earth.

POINTS TO PONDER

Traditions have always been an important dimension of celebrating faith. Each age is a time of special grace, including our age of high technology.

Did You Know?

I went to Mass during Ordinary Time, but the priest wasn't wearing Green. Why?

Typically, the priest will be wearing green at Mass on Sundays during this time. However, some Sundays and weekday Masses are special days and white may be worn (or the occasional red). They may be in order of importance: Solemnities, Feasts, Obligatory Memorials, Optional Memorials. Some examples are: The Most Holy Trinity, *Corpus Christi*, Christ the King.

What is the Communion of Saints?

Without the intense focus that we have during Lent and Advent, Ordinary Time can be a good time to explore and reflect also on the lives of the saints on their feast days. As we follow the saints feast days there is much to be learnt and to ponder for our lives - what significance can we find and relate to our own season. Some saints you might like to check out are St. Thomas Aquinas - January 28, Our Lady of Fatima - May 13, St. Kateri Tekakwitha - July 14, St. Ignatius of Loyola - July 31, St. Augustine - August 28, St. Francis of Assisi - October 4, and St. John Paul II - October 22.

Other liturgical seasons have 'things to do' such as fasting, social justice... so how can you make Ordinary Time special too?

What a great time to focus on the day-to-day life of Jesus. Find time to learn about the Saints. Find new ways to pray – this might come out of your study of the Saints. Create or rejuvenate your home prayer space. Spend time in nature and gain an even deeper appreciation for the wonderful creation that God has gifted us with. As we learn through the humanity of Jesus in this time so too can we learn to be more like Christ in our human world.

I'm not Catholic, how can I experience ordinary time? What can it mean to me?

With the hustle and bustle of our busy world it can be difficult to find order in the chaos. Ordinary Time comes to us after two of those very busy times in the religious, and secular, world - Christmas and Easter. Finding time to get reorganised, to breathe and to refocus on the importance of relationship, being in nature and reflecting on our lives cannot be understated. What a great time to find Christ in the small moments of a day.

This day of solemnity is held on the first Friday following the Feast of Corpus Christi which happened to be June 7 this year, and a group gathered in the Diocesan Library for Formation Friday to explore the historical and cultural context of this devotion. Those gathered expressed how the image and devotions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus were part of their upbringing. This image hung on the wall of most Catholic households, I still have the image that hung in my grandparents loungeroom, one participant recalled the image hanging in their grandparent's bedroom, another spoke of deciding to buy a particular house because this image was the first thing they saw when they walked into the property, another recalled weekly Friday devotions that occurred in classrooms and the home. While the image and devotional prayers were well known its origins were not. The most significant source for the devotion to the Sacred Heart known today was Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647–1690), a nun of the Order of the Visitation of Holy Mary, who claimed to have received apparitions of Jesus Christ between 1673 and 1675 in the Burgundian French village of Paray-le-Monial.

As she prayed before the Blessed Sacrament in her community chapel, she saw Christ's heart pierced and bleeding with flames and a crown of thorns. According to St Margaret Mary, 'He told me to behold his heart which so loved humanity. Then he seemed to take my very heart from me and place it there in his heart.' Her spiritual director a young Jesuit priest saw her visions to be authentic as they were rooted in Scripture and tradition and these experiences were recorded.

Fast forward 200 years and Pope Leo XII was about to undergo surgery at the age of 89 and in his contemplative prayer he rereads a letter from a cloistered nun who claims she has received powerful visions from the Lord. In her letter she made a bold request, Jesus wants to consecrate the entire world to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Pope Leo XII promised that if he pulled through the surgery, he would do just this, after prayer and consultation he made this consecration in 1899, 125 years ago this year. The consecration has been renewed every year by every pope since then, Pope Leo XII on the eve of the new century and by Pope John Paul II in 1999 on eve of the new millennium.

If you enter our own Sacred Heart Cathedral in Hamilton, you will see images of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and to the left a side chapel devoted to Margaret Mary Alacoque.

Alacoque believed that in her apparitions Jesus promised twelve specific blessings to those who practice devotion to his Sacred Heart. These promises can be viewed in the side chapel.

If we look to number nine of the promises, I will bless those places wherein the image of My Sacred Heart shall be exposed and venerated, this might explain why the image of the Sacred Heart was in so many homes in times gone by.

One thing has not changed, and that is the condition of the heart. It is seen as a centre of emotion, a place of prayer and decision. We listen from the heart and act from the heart. In 2024 we can look at our contemporary society and consider "where is the heart?" Pope Francis announced earlier this month that he is preparing to write a document dedicated to the devotion of the Sacred Heart to "illuminate the path of ecclesial renewal, but also to say something significant to a world that seems to have lost its heart."

Pope Leo XII saw the beginning of a materialistic society in 1899 and wrote about this in the encyclical Rerum Novarum, On Human Labour. This groundbreaking document released during the height of the industrial revolution and child labour was the beginning of a list of church documents highlighting concerns for humanity and our world. These documents along with the wisdom from the Hebrew prophets and Jesus' recorded actions form the foundations of the Catholic Social Teachings which are centred on the heart, love, mission and outreach.

Pope Leo's act of consecration was pastoral and prophetic, he had a deep desire to entrust all of humanity to the Heart of Christ. This acts as a symbol for Jesus' love for us, but also provides us with a reminder that we are called to love one another.
