The word straight stands for honesty and right living. Crooked on the other hand stands for dishonesty, cheating deceit and so on.

If there is a crooked attitude, or some crooked way of behaving or some crooked relationship that needs to be straightened out, let us try to do so this Advent.

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Reflection for Second Sunday of Advent Year B — 10th December 2023

The appearance of the Lord Jesus to Israel began with the ministry of John the Baptist in the desert & by the River Jordan. All four Evangelists present the work of John as a prologue to the public ministry of Jesus.

Similar to the Book of Genesis, Mark speaks of "the beginning"but this time it's the beginning of the Gospel of Jesus, the Messiah, the Son of God.

It opens with a desert scene where John, a character embedded in his desert surroundings, is spreading the message of repentance to all the people. Some of the Scribes & Pharisees saw him as being possessed by demons because of his solitary lifestyle, having a strange diet of locusts & wild honey & wearing a garment made from camel skin- however, he knew from experience that being in the desert helped him to focus his mind on his mission to announce the coming of Jesus. How often did Jesus retreat to a quiet place to restore his thoughts & energy? Certainly crowds of people flocked to hear John him speak as they had not heard the voice of a prophet in their land for a long time

They were convinced that God was again speaking to his people, reassuring them that their famine & drought days were about to end- that "their hunger & thirst would NOT be for bread & water-but for hearing the word of the Lord" (Am 8:11).

The Israelites had no positive vision for their lives or dreams. They knew where they had come from, but they didn't know where they were going, as everything was based on what they had already seen & could see -they did not know how to see with "the eye of faith".

We, too, need a positive vision for our lives -a vision for the future that is not determined by our past or even present circumstances.

Our Liturgical preparation for Christmas, the Season of Advent, commenced last Sunday when we were told to "Be awake, on guard & ready to welcome the Master of the house", whose time of coming is unknown to us.

We use various symbols in the Church to help us focus on the importance of this Season.

- -The Advent wreath- GREEN & CIRCULAR, symbolises strength & represents the fulfilment of time being achieved as we await the coming of Jesus.
- -The 3 PURPLE candles suggest penance & fasting & the royal colour of the coming King.
- -The PINK candle represents our joy & expectation as we wait. During the coming weeks, for sure, we will be busy shopping for food, gifts, sendings cards, making phone calls & perhaps

attending parties— but how much time will we set aside to prepare for & celebrate the Birthday of Jesus? After all, without his birth there would be NO Christmas!

Amidst all our preparations we can easily fail to hear that voice calling to us, reminding us to "prepare the way of the Lord". Let us pray that we don't get so bogged down by all our activities that we miss the Miracle!

The words of the Collect in today's Mass urge us to pray that "no earthly undertaking will hinder those who set out in haste to meet Jesus".

St Mary MacKillop's words in 1889- "We must hold ourselves in readiness for God's will whichever way things go" —She suggests that we find our own version of 'the wilderness' so that we are prepared for the times when the God of surprises knocks on the door of our heart.

"The wilderness will lead you to your heart where I will speak". Hosea 2:14. Heather White

Year 1 collaborated on constructing an Acrostic poem about DIVERSITY and used available resources to create models that showed what 'diversity' means to them.

Year 2 learned about Braille and practiced writing their name in Braille. They then decorated headbands with their name written in Braille.

Year 6 created messages using the Communicating with Braille code and completed the brainstorm activities. They proposed creative solutions to everyday situations that people with disabilities may face

A couple of recent appointments by Bishop Michael Kennedy will significantly affect the Macquarie Pastoral Region-(Watagan Deanery).

Mr Christopher Voigt (currently Parish leader at Toronto) is the successful candidate for the position of Manager Bishop's Office and so Toronto will be without leadership from January 2024

As all would be aware Fr Greg Barker is now both Parish Priest and Vicar General Therefore Fr Greg Barker has been appointed as Administrator of Toronto while Toronto discerns possibilities for its future governance with the Chancellor.

Priests assisting Fr Greg Barker in the parishes of Booragul, Boolaroo-Warners Bay, St Jospeh's Toronto, as well as St John Vianney Morisset are Fr Raphael Madukwe, effective 31 January 2024 until further notice. • Fr Darryl Mackie, effective 31 January 2024 until further notice. Fr Darryl is returning to the Diocese after being on loan to Sydney where he has been chaplain to St Vincent's Hospital. Fr Darryl will be part time in the parish (s) and part time in the Inter-Diocesan Tribunal. He is replacing Mrs Jane Dunn who has retired as Director. Deacon Naveen has also been appointed to the region, and will continue his discernment/formation towards priesthood under the direction of Fr Greg Barker

Fr Priyantha Fernando has been appointed as Assistant Priest, assisting Fr George Anthicad in the six parishes of the Maitland area, effective 31 January 2024 until further notice.

Cooranbong Cemetery

This notice is to advise parishioners of recent developments at Cooranbong Church.

As most people would be aware our parish has a cemetery in the grounds of St Patrick and St Bridgid Church Cooranbong, which is beautifully maintained by Parish Volunteers.

Since the opening of the new Sports Complex, people have used the Babers Rd extension, to park their cars in the cul-de-sac adjacent to the cemetery, to access the Sporting Complex.

This has lead to people constantly walking through the cemetery and over the graves, besides cutting the boundary fence, removing the posts and throwing them into the adjacent lagoon, to gain easy access to the Complex. The private cemetery which must comply with CCNSW legislation, has now become a public thoroughfare, which has also attracted motorbikes.

Council was approached some months ago, to see if it would consider making a southern pedestrian access to the new Sporting Complex, outside of the Church/Cemetery boundary off Babers Rd.

It has taken Council four months to respond to the request. The response being that it will be reviewing the matter in the coming six weeks. Taking the Christmas holidays into consideration, this probably means that it will be mid-February, before we hear anything from Council.

Meanwhile, acting on advice given by the Diocesan Legal Team, the Parish Leadership Team together with the groundsman, erected private property signs This has not been well received by some locals who have systematically removed the signs.

In the meantime, we wait on advice from Council.

Bishop Michael Kennedy Christmas Message.

While Christmas may not be our holiest day of the year, it is often our most joyful. For the birth of the child Jesus – the Son of God born in human flesh – expresses most tenderly the love that God has for us, his closeness to us, and his desire that we draw closer to him and to one another.

Christmas and the child Jesus do indeed draw us closer together around him. It seems to be the time of year that we most desire to be together, and so we come together in these Christmas weeks for all manner of gatherings as workmates, as friends, as neighbours, and as family.

Christmas also seems to be the time in which we reflect upon the year that has just been and the year that is about to begin. There is something more profound happening here than Christmas merely coinciding with the New Year period. Rather, I encourage us all to more consciously bring our year that has just been to our Lord Jesus, to present it to him with all its joys and challenges, to reflect in his light on how we have fared in our choices and actions, and to seek his guidance, grace, and blessing upon our lives and plans for the year ahead.

As I reflect on the past 12 months to bring them to the Lord, I

would like to share four things with you

First, personally it was a big year for me as God's changing plans for me unfolded in my move from Armidale to Maitland-Newcastle. This came as a surprise to me, but it gave me the opportunity to renew my trust in God and my commitment to serve. I reflect with gratitude on the warm welcome, open hearts, and human kindness that I have received here from so many people both within and outside the Church.

Second, at a local level I am reminded of the deep sorrow that gripped our community earlier this year after the Hunter bus tragedy. The loss of precious life shook many of us to the core as we mourned together. But we also prayed together and supported one another through this profound grief. In that time of darkness, we witnessed the grace of God and the best of human nature

Third, the most significant event of the year at a national level was probably the Voice referendum. Whilst both the result and the tone of some of the campaigning may have been disappointing to some, I think the whole process highlighted a couple of things on which we as a nation should be proud and can build for the future: Australians are greatly concerned for wanting better lives and outcomes for our indigenous people, and it is possible for good people to reach different conclusions about the best way to achieve desired goals and outcomes, in which case listening to each other is crucial.

Fourth, at a global level, we were shocked and horrified by the Hamas attack on Israel, reminding us of the hatred that can be stirred up in human hearts and, as a result, just how precarious peace can be. Our thoughts continue to be with those living in the midst of the ongoing conflict in Gaza, as well as those in Ukraine. In the face of such violence, we are called to be instruments of peace, to pray earnestly, and to strive for understanding. For those with eyes to see, these events also brought about many acts of solidarity and kindness.

So, this Christmas we bring to the Lord a year of both darkness and light, sorrow and joy, grief and hope. I'm sure your own life too which you bring to the Lord reflects this same interplay of good and evil in some way, as does mine. Our world and each of our lives need the faith, hope, and love of God who in the Child Jesus brings us together. I wish you a truly joyful Christmas and blessed new year. + Michael Kennedy.

We wait for new heavens and a new earth.

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

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LITURGY MATTERS: Exuberant Praise and Worship

When engaging and addressing the spirituality of young people, it is important to understand where they are, especially in light of an eclectic and uncertain world. As more young people find ways to navigate this everchanging society, providing them with spiritual guidance can strengthen their connection and growth with their faith.

While research has looked at the declining connectedness of young people with traditional religion and their tentative exploration of spirituality, our young people are passionate when it comes to social justice. They have become aware, proactive and advocate for many issues, and they can communicate and gain support like no other generation. They crave a more inclusive, sustainable, authentic world based in integrity.

As "young people need integrity and authenticity when searching for their faith." (Bouma, 2006, p. 99), then how can we, as a community of faith, provide that space for our young people?

The parish of MacKillop (Charlestown, Gateshead, Redhead) is trying to do just that. It is working on creating more contemporary and engaging forms of prayer to better connect with everyone and with the young people as a priority. Music is a central part of this endeavour. In the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, we read the importance given to sacred music. It reads that the "musical tradition of the universal Church is a treasure of inestimable value, greater even than that of any other art (and is) to be preserved and fostered with great care (so) the whole body of the faithful may be able to contribute that active participation which is rightly theirs" [a.112,114].
