In todays Gospel the prayer of the blind man Bartimaeus when he met Jesus was, 'Lord that I may see'.

It is a prayer which we can make our own, because in many ways we too are blind. Jesus wants to open our eyes too. We have to distinguish between sight and vision.

Just because we have good eyesight it doesn't mean we have good vision. It is not with the eyes only that we see. We also see with the mind, the heart and imagination.

A narrow mind, a small heart, and a deprived imagination lead to a loss of vision, and narrow our world.

This Sunday let us pray, that in the midst of our own darkness, we may obtain the vision that Jesus gave to Bartimaeus.

Moving Forward

As you are aware, Option B, the 'Shared Parish Priest Model' was the preferred option from the recent voting. The decision was subsequently submitted to the Bishop.

It was the intention of the present PPC to convene a Parish Assembly, to formalise a new Pastoral Council, and a new Pastoral Team and commence Safeguarding training to support the chosen model.

Acting on advice from the Vicar General, the Assembly has been 'put on hold,' until a shared priest has been appointed.

While we wait for the Bishop's appointment, the parish will remain under the leadership of John and Uta.

GOSPEL

Mark 10:46-52

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they

called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Year B — Reflection 27th October 2024

We can hear the readings each week at Mass, but often do not recognise the connections with our real-life issues.

One reason is that we may assume that the Bible is ancient history, so we don't expect it to speak to modern questions. Or, that the language of the Bible is not quite the same as today, so the verbal clues are not always obvious.

In today's Gospel, Jesus meets a blind man by the name of Bartimaeus. Jesus said, 'What do you wish me to do for you?' There's no doubt about it. Competition is as keen today as it was during Jesus' time. Human nature hasn't changed much in the last two thousand years. Jesus said that his mission, was 'to open the eyes of the blind'.

Jesus' mission was not so much a question of bringing physical sight to people, but of bringing them vision, of giving them another way of looking at life. It wasn't a question of opening people's eyes physically, but of opening their minds, their imaginations and especially their hearts.

Scripture tells us that before we ask for the power to do something, we should ask for the ability to see—to see the anger and prejudice that fuel the political divide. It is only when we see and understand the world as it really is, that we will be able to make the world what God wants it to be

Today's Gospel calls us to throw off that cloak, open our eyes and simplify our life, leaving behind the things that weigh us down.

Not everyone is called to the life of a beach bum, but there is much freedom in a simple life with less possessions. It is all those belongings that drain us without us even realizing it.

But how do we recognize when we are so overcome by the distractions or disorder of life, that we leave our faith and spirituality as an afterthought? How do we nurture our relationship with God when there is so much to divert us from what will give us real joy?

Did you know? All Saints' Day

On May 13, A.D.609, Pope Boniface IV dedicated this date to honour of all Christian martyrs, and the Catholic feast of All Martyrs Day was established in the Western church. Pope Gregory III later expanded the festival to include all saints as well as all martyrs and moved the observance from May 13 to November 1.

In A.D. 1000, the church made November 2 All Souls' Day, a day to honour the dead. It's widely believed today that the church was attempting to replace the Celtic festival of the dead with a related, church-sanctioned holiday. The All-Saints' Day celebration was also called All-hallows or All-Hallowmas (from Middle English Alholowmesse meaning All Saints' Day. All Hallows Eve or Halloween gave its name to a Celtic Druid custom.

Halloween has come to be associated with several activities. One is the practice of pulling usually harmless pranks. Celebrants wear masks and costumes for parties and for trick-or-treating, Trick-or-treaters go from house to house with the threat that they will pull a trick if they do not receive a treat, usually sweets.

How GambleAware helped Jonathan take control of his life

Forty years, more than 50 attempts, and a whole lot of determination is what it took Jonathan* to take control of his gambling.

It's something he's struggled with since he was eight years old, when Jonathan was introduced to betting on horse racing.

It was 1982, and he asked his grandparents if he could place a bet, which he did, and won. In his words, it was "one of the worst things that could have happened" because it sparked what became a lifelong interest in gambling on horse racing.

Jonathan says that each year, his obsession with gambling got worse.

He'd spend more and more money and time at the TAB, and then, when it became available, he would also bet online.

"I had a hard time at school, so I would use it as an escape," Jonathan said.

"I would ring up and put \$5 on a horse, and that would get me through a couple of weeks.

"As the years went on, it got to the point where I was betting most days. When I got a full-time job, I spent a lot of my money. "I didn't have many friends, so I guess I used it to pass the time." At 21, Jonathan realised he had a problem and "tried and tried and tried" to give it up.

For years, he'd block websites, try different counselling and groups, and avoid visiting the TAB or watching the racing, but nothing ever stuck. Jonathan would get through a couple of months without gambling, but would then break.

About 18 months ago, he decided he needed some extra help, so he reached out to GambleAware Hunter New England, a program run by CatholicCare Social Services Hunter-Manning.

This is when he met Gambling Counsellor Tammy, who has been in his corner ever since, providing guidance and a listening ear on his journey.

"My GambleAware counsellor is just amazing," Jonathan said.

"Tammy understands what I am going through, is very supportive, and never judgy.

"She is genuinely excited when I tell her about a milestone too – she's helped a lot."

Fast forward to now, and it's nearly been nearly 12 months since he last gambled. Jonathan is not sure why "quitting" this time around has been so successful, but he is so grateful.

"I'm almost up to a year now, so I've gone 10 months without a bet," he said.

"It's amazing. It's the longest I've ever gone, and it hasn't been that difficult. The only thing I have wanted to bet on was the election, but I avoided it.

"I don't watch any races. If one comes on, I just change the channel – I haven't had any serious attempts to put a bet on at all " $\,$

Even when Jonathan sees a betting ad on TV, something he thinks should be more regulated by the government, he has been able to avoid any temptation.

While he knows it's something he will continue to battle with for the rest of his life, Jonathan is determined to keep marking milestones – every month without gambling is a huge win.

He is sharing his story to raise awareness of gambling harm and encourage people to get help during GambleAware Week.

Jonathan encourages people who are struggling not to give up. If it weren't for his persistence, he would still be losing money, and he knows a lot of people are probably in situations just like him.

GambleAware Week is an annual initiative aimed at increasing community awareness of the risks of gambling and gambling harm. It also highlights support services that are available to anyone affected by gambling: for people who gamble and their families and friends.
