
FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT YEAR C 22 DECEMBER 2024

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Welcome

Welcome to all the visitors to our Parish of St john Vianney during the summer holiday season.

The Parish of St John Vianney Morisset, was officially formed in 1947, however our Mass center of St Patrick and St Brigid at Cooranbong, dates to the 1860's. The present Cooranbong Church celebrated its centenary in August 2006, and 150 years of Catholic presence in the area was celebrated in 2011.

It is documented that Saint Mary McKillop visited Cooranbong where she had a convent school. Up until 1966 St John Vianney Parish was part of the Diocese of Sydney, but now it is part of the Diocese of Maitland / Newcastle, with Bishop Michael Kennedy as Bishop.

The 9.30am Mass at Morisset is recorded each Sunday and uploaded to the Parish Website and Facebook later in the day, internet allowing. This allows people in nursing facilities and those away from the parish for whatever reason, to keep 'in touch' with the parish.

His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.

Fourth Sunday of Advent Year C - 22nd December 2024 Reflection

The end of the year is coming very quickly. Christmas is just around the corner, and we are invited to look forward to the coming of Jesus, in a special way.

John the Baptist dominated the early weeks of Advent, and today it is Mary and Elizabeth, who now come to the center stage. The stage was small, but the audience has been millions ever since. The prayers they said have been also said ever since.

As we approach Christmas, we have lots of hopes and expectations.

As we ponder Mary's acceptance of God's request, we are invited to join her, in dropping normal expectations.

Base jumpers stand on the top of a very high cliff, or a vertical mountain, and look down a thousand or more feet, to see the fields on the valley floor far below.

Some lack the faith, to make that leap, and never jump. Others take a deep breath and go.

Mary was also asked to take a great leap of faith.

As she stood fearfully on the edge of the cliff of her decision, her trusting "Yes", was her confident response. With that she jumped,

The coming of Christ among us, which we celebrate at Christmas, means believers are called to make a difference in our world.

Unless Jesus is born within us, and in our world, then our celebration of his birth in Bethlehem long ago is false.

Caritas Australia launches a Vanuatu earthquake appeal

At least 14 people have been killed in Vanuatu following two earthquakes in 24 hours, impacting an estimated 116,000 people.

Hundreds of people are injured or trapped following the collapse of buildings resulting from successive 7.4 and 6.1 magnitude earthquakes. As rescue efforts continue, the death toll is expected to rise. The Port Vila hospital has been overwhelmed, having also sustained damage resulting in the closure of operating theatres.

Two major water reserves that supply Port Vila have also been destroyed, with assessment into water supplies ongoing. Major damage to infrastructure has been sustained, impacting communications, airport runways, bridges including the Tagabe, Teouma and Black Sand bridges, and the main port.

As part of the Church Agencies Network Disaster Operations (CANDO) Caritas Australia will be supporting on the ground through its partners. These partners are assessing the situation, and are ready to respond to the humanitarian requirements, which are likely to include emergency shelter, food, and other essentials, as well as psychosocial support.

Sally Thomas, Humanitarian Manager at Caritas Australia said, "Vanuatu, and particularly Port Vila, has been devastated. People are now trying to recover and perform rescues with damage to infrastructure such as bridges, telecommunications, water supplies, and the local hospital."

"Many are fearing further disaster as Vanuatu is one of the most susceptible countries to natural disasters such as earthquakes, storm damage, flooding, and tsunamis. These disasters are unfortunately the most common place at this time of year, when many of us are celebrating and enjoying a break."

"As we embrace the festivities, we must remember that our brothers and sisters in Vanuatu, who need our compassion and support as they recover."

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LITURGY MATTERS: Perseverance – the art of not giving up; of keeping hope

As we finish making our way through Advent, then into the Christmas season, and then the New Year, we often find time to reflect on the year that was. There are many aspects to the year that may come to mind when we think about areas that required perseverance. Maybe it was a new job, study, subsequent setbacks, social justice plights, relationships, health goals, illness,

or other challenges and obstacles.

Sometimes giving up might seem the easy way forward. Our faith says otherwise. When I think about people in the gospel who persisted, I realise that their reward was healing and new life

In John 5:5-9 we find a paralysed man at a pool in Bethesda, struggling to get to the water for a healing miracle. As the gospel reads, it was only the first person who made it to the water at a certain time who would be healed. Although the man persevered, he was never successful. Jesus saw his struggles and asked the man if he wanted to be healed. Jesus did heal him with just a word, and gave him new life.

In Luke 8:43-48 we find a woman who suffered with chronic bleeding for twelve years. Even though she persevered in getting help, no one was able to heal her, and she had exhausted her finances. Hearing about Jesus and his ability to heal she decided to push through her pain. All she needed for healing was to touch the hem of Jesus' garment. In reaching out and having faith in Jesus, she received his comfort and healing.

These two stories teach us that no matter what we are going through God knows us intimately and wants to provide comfort, healing and hope. Sometimes our hope can seem distant but by persevering in looking for ways to come through those times, and by trusting and keeping our faith in God we can be transformed and blessed.

And so, we come to Christmas. When Caesar Augustus issued a decree that there was going to be a census of the known world, people had to return to their homelands to be registered. Joseph, therefore, had to register in Bethlehem. He, and a very pregnant Mary, travelled from Nazareth to Bethlehem (around 150km on foot). I can't even begin to imagine the difficulties that Mary had to persevere through having to travel that distance. For someone so young, she had put the ultimate trust in God. Not long after they arrived in Bethlehem, it was time for Mary to give birth to Jesus (this name means Emmanuel - God is with us). Mary continues to be a wonderful role model of perseverance to Christians around the world. She did not give up even though when so many times she was challenged and suffered as the mother of Jesus. She persevered with the will of God in her life, in her support of Jesus, and ultimately at the foot of the cross.

Of Mary, Pope Benedict XVI stated:

'...we join our voices to the many generations who praise the Virgin Mary and call

her Blessed ... Her example of faithful perseverance in doing the will of God and her

heavenly reward are a source of courage and hope for all of us' [1]

10 Questions about Christmas Time

In our latest edition of 10 Questions, Fiona Duque explores the liturgical season of Christmas Time.

What is Christmas Time?

Christmas Time is the liturgical season that begins for many people at the Vigil Mass on the 24 December, which is liturgically known as the Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord and finishing with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This next year, it will be Sunday 12 January. FYI: Vigil = Mass the evening before a Solemnity, and it = a celebration of great significance – more to follow in 2025.

What is meant to be the focus for us during Christmas Time?

This time is a very important liturgical season for the Church. Here, we find the mystery of the incarnation (the putting on of flesh), where God becomes one of us. It is a wonderful, joyous time of celebration as we reflect on the gift of salvation that Jesus' birth will ultimately give us.

What is involved in Christmas Time?

Christmas Time is one of the shortest liturgical seasons in the year, but it packs a punch for what it delivers. It starts with an octave (this is where a feast day gets extra time – 8 days – to be celebrated). Within the octave, the following feasts are included: Holy Family, Saints Stephen, John and the Holy Innocents. The octave (last) day is another Solemnity – Mary, the Holy Mother of God.

How many days does Christmas Time go for?

This is a tricky question to answer. It changes year to year depending on the Solemnity of the Epiphany (aka the arrival of the wise men that we read in Matthew 2:1). This date is always observed (celebrated) on a Sunday (itsactual day is 6 January, and that could be any day of the week). So, for 23/24, it lasted 15 days and for 24/25, it will last 19 days.

Why is the colour white significant during Christmas Time? Colours have always played an important part in the liturgical life of the church. Gone is the Advent purple, and white has arrived. The white signifies celebrations of the Lord (other than his passion – this is red). White reminds us of the light of Jesus

coming into the world, his innocence and purity, and the joy that his birth brought to humanity.

What are the other important days of significance in Christmas Time?

It is much easier to list these: December 26 - St Stephen (the first martyr), 27 - St John the Evangelist, 28 – The Holy Innocents (martyrs), and the Sunday within the Octave – The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. January 1 – Mary, the Holy Mother of God.

What is the significance of Boxing Day?

Boxing Day isn't a significant day for the Church. The Church remembers St Stephen on this day. However, it is a day steeped in tradition. Originating in Ye Old England around the 16th century, it was a day when servants and tradespeople were

thanked with a day off and gifts. Unfortunately, it's now just about the Boxing Day sales.

Why do we have Christmas Trees?

Who doesn't love a bit of greenery? Now, we are thanking the Germans. Originating in the late Middle Ages through a play about Adam and Eve (it's a long story), Germans used a cutting from a fir tree as they are evergreen in winter. They decorated them on the 24 December, often with apples. Through immigration, the Germans took it to the rest of the world and the decorations just snowballed.

Why do we celebrate Christmas on the 25 December? This date was established by the Church around the fourth century. There are many different perspectives and explanations about why this date. This is what we do know: It was the winter solstice for the Roman Empire, it was a time of pagan celebrations but was eventually enculturated into the Gospel story when Pope Julius I, who was the Pope at the time, formalised it.

I am not Catholic; how can I get involved?

You don't have to be Catholic to get involved. It is a time for families to come together to celebrate the gift and love that family members are to each other and to neighbours. Maybe it is time to return to Mass and be reminded about the message of the birth of Jesus. What about rethinking St Stephen's Feast Day (Boxing Day) and thinking about what you can give to others who need it most?
