Dear Parish Family,

Over the past few Sundays, we have been reflecting upon the image of God. It began firstly with the fact that God has a special love for those who are poor, those who are homeless, those who are grieving (sad) and those who stand up for what they believe; basically, those who are doing it tough. Last Sunday, we heard Jesus speak about God is a God of love, mercy, and forgiveness. Having reflected upon these images of God and that given we are made in the image and likeness of God then we should be the same (God-like) to everyone.

Following on from this, this Sunday calls us into something deeper – to now look inside ourselves. Who are we and how do we act? It raises the issue that sometimes we can make unfair and uninformed judgments of others. I've always liked this illustration of the speck versus the log. While it might seem exaggerated and perhaps funny, it's a reminder that we never know what's going on for another person that might be impacting their life or the decisions they are making. When someone makes a judgement call about another person without first looking at themselves, it's what Jesus calls being a hypocrite!



Hypocrite is an interesting word. Do you know where it comes from? In ancient Greece, actors wore masks which concealed their true face. One might say that they were 'two-faced'. They were called 'Hypocrites', and that's where we derive our word. Jesus always condemned this behaviour, in fact on Ash Wednesday our gospel again highlights not to be like the mask wearing hypocrites. It's something to ponder, as we leave Ordinary Time for a few months, as we begin the Season of Lent this week. Lent is our annual forty-day retreat, as you know a time that calls us to look at relationships - our relationship with God, relationship with others and even our relationship with ourselves. We do this through prayer, fasting almsgiving.

Prayer = Love of God (Do I take time out in my day to thank God for all that surrounds me?)

Almsgiving = Love of neighbour (Is there someone I haven't reached out to for some time?)

Fasting = Love of self (Am I looking after my body, am I resting well, am I exercising?)

As we did last year, we will be holding some weekday reflection evenings with the opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. An opportunity to draw us deeper into the Lenten retreat. Dates to be advised next weekend.

This weekend many will be attending the Diocesan Jubilee Pilgrimage on Sunday with the walk from the Nobby's foreshore beginning at 8am, with others joining us at the Mass in the Sacred Heart Cathedral and a fiesta in the grounds of the Cathedral. We look forward to celebrating our jubilee year with our diocesan brothers and sisters, with our schools and parishes being represented. Sisters of Faith dinner inspires participants

More than 90 women filled the seats of the Victor Peters Suite last Thursday night as they gathered for our annual Sisters of Faith dinner

In 2025, Rev. Faaimata Havea Hiliau addressed the crowd. She spoke about her upbringing, background, and her role as the Moderator of the Uniting Church Synod of NSW and ACT.

The audience was moved as Rev. Faaimata recalled being a small child of only eight and being bundled into the family car in the middle of the night to head north to work picking fruit. It was decades later that she discovered that the family were illegal immigrants.

Her passion for climate change was apparent when we spoke of her experience of returning to her birthplace of Tonga and witnessing the destruction and disappearance of the small islands due to the rising tides.


Rev. Faaimata powerful message spoke of the need for women to be heard and recognised in our world.

A panel of four women representing, Baha'l, Anglican, Catholic and Uniting Church faiths spoke about their understanding of inclusion. From connecting in community with African drum beats and tango lessons at 80 years of age, respecting those who are losing their hearing to the need to allow young people to feel comfortable and safe to ask questions.

These women spoke of the need to create a caring, loving community where people feel respected.

"The Sisters of Faith Dinner was a wonderful witness to how women are bringing peace to the world," Mission & Evangelisation Partner – Participation Fiona Duque said.
