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Reflection for Third Sunday of Easter Year B — 14th April 2024

In the weeks after Easter, a time we call the Easter season, we are made aware yet again, that Easter is more than a season; it is a way of life.

Therefore, it seems appropriate that we occasionally travel back to our roots to appreciate our ancestors, and learn from their insights and accomplishments, as well as their struggles and failures.

The Easter season is also an opportunity for us to trace our spiritual roots, and to learn anew, whom we are called to be. Many of us have traced our own physical roots. Websites like ancestry dot com, help us to examine the branches and leaves of our family tree.

Some searches affirm what we already know, while others uncover some unexpected surprises. By learning about where we came from, we can gain a better sense of who we are.

When we undertake the challenge of tracing our spiritual roots, we are blessed with mentors whose efforts can reacquaint us with those who have gone before us in faith. How the faith was preserved, protected, and passed on from mother to daughter and father to son.

The second and third generation of Christians realised that it was their responsibility to carry the good news to the ends of the earth, discriminating against no one, and welcoming all. They shared the gifts of God's love and mercy with whomever God placed on their way.

In the Acts of the Apostles, we hear how that generation of believers, attempted to live life in Jesus after his resurrection. They realised that it was their responsibility to carry the good news to the ends of the earth.

If we take nothing else with us from April's sacred texts, let it be the command to love as Jesus loves. This excludes anything that goes against love: war; violence; discrimination about race, religion, political differences, age, gender, sexual orientation.

How radically might the world be transformed if we were to take Jesus at his word:

Love one another as I love you! -John France.

Anointing of the Sick

Prior to Vatican II, Anointing of the Sick was commonly called Extreme Unction. In practice it had become the announcer of death, and people stayed away from it as long as they could, until all else failed. As such it sometimes became a game of chicken.

Vatican II revived the Church's more complete understanding of this sacrament. It is not the sacrament of the dead. Like all sacraments, it is a life-giving encounter with the risen Christ for the living, who need healing.

We use the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick in the way it better serves the living.

God, however, raised him from the dead, and to that fact we are the witnesses.

'Now I know, brothers, that neither you nor your leaders had any idea what you were really doing; this was the way God carried out what he had foretold, when he said through all his prophets that his Christ would suffer. Now you must repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out.'

They were still talking about all this when Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you!' In a state of alarm and fright, they thought they were seeing a ghost. But he said, 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have.' And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

Then he told them, 'This is what I meant when I said, while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses, in the Prophets and in the Psalms, has to be fulfilled.' He then opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'So you see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. 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LITURGY MATTERS: New Life - Alleluia!

Happy Easter! For my friend Bernadette, new life abounds because on Easter Wednesday she

became a grandmother for the first time! Little Joseph Samuel has transformed Bernadette and her family.

Seeing the delight on Bernadette's face and listening to the stories of Joseph's arrival brought back memories of the joy and excitement in our family when new babies arrive.

They become the focus. Our conversation is transformed. How we gather and what we do changes. What time we schedule things is different. We sing different songs, do mad dances, rock when we hold them, make funny faces and read different books.

The shopping list changes, and we frequent different shops. Who knew babies could require so many wardrobe changes!

Leaving the house if you are the parents, or preparing the house if you are the grandparents involves meticulous planning. For Bernadette this has only just begun! How exciting.

Over Easter, a similar story unfolded in many of our parishes as we baptised, confirmed and shared Eucharist with all those who, having undertaken the journey of Christian Initiation, stood before us and declared their desire to be immersed into the life, death and resurrection of Christ. We had two adults initiated at the Easter Vigil in the Cathedral, and then last Sunday night Bishop Michael confirmed another young woman.

It is a privilege to be present at these celebrations. Without exception these new Catholics shine with joy and delight and love and absolute relief that what they have longed for has finally come to be!

I've been Catholic all my life so I can become a little blasé about my faith, and disengaged from the constant call to surrender to God's love and be renewed. My hope can become a little dull, my worship a little routine. But let me tell you, such feelings are transformed in the excitement of the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation. You can't help but be touched.

Just as Bernadette and her family will accompany Joseph and his parents, so we are called to accompany our new Catholics over the next twelve months. During this time, they hold a place honour when our parish gathers for worship.

Just as Bernadette's family will do with Joseph, we are called to wrap the newly initiated around with our care and concern as we continue to share our faith with them and invite them ever more deeply into the Church's life and mission.

And just like Bernadette's family, nothing in our parishes will be exactly the same. Why? Because the delight of new faith often draws our attention to aspects of our life that we may not have considered for some time.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults sets out a magnificent vision for the initiation and accompaniment of those whom God is calling to Catholic life and faith. It places Initiation at the heart of parish life and designates it as the responsibility of all the baptised, not just the relevant team. If we dare to engage with this vision our whole community will find new life!

Bernadette and her family are forever changed by the arrival of Joseph Samuel. It is my hope and prayer that our parish communities are also changed and renewed by the new life that constantly comes to us through the ministry of Christian Initiation. While we continue to accompany those initiated at Easter, we will soon be invited to accompany those families who present their baptised children for confirmation and first eucharist. I hope you're all ready!

One of my favourite scripture references is from John's Gospel where Jesus says to the disciples, 'I call you friends.' People will experience the friendship of God in the friendship we extend to them. It is up to each one of us to be a friend of God to all people, and to accompany with deep care. those who experience the call to follow God in our Catholic family.

Alpha course unites young people

When you hear the word Catholic what comes to mind? Is it a church? A priest? Maybe it's a specific prayer or bible verse? ELIZABETH SYMINGTON PUBLISHED MARCH 02, 2024

While these are all wonderful things, I want you to imagine a different scene. Picture a room full of young people bonding over their faith and love of Jesus. They're sharing the joy of the Gospel over food, conversation, and music.

Doesn't that sound inviting?

Well, that's exactly what happened at the University of Newcastle Catholic Society's recent Alpha course.

The society opened up a space for people to learn about Christianity, make new connections and experience personal growth.

Run with support from the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle's Pastoral Ministries team, the program gave participants the chance to find comfort while they worked through the different things that were happening in their lives. Attendee Joshua Latimore describes Alpha as a place to create a community and bond.

"The Alpha experience was a series of courses over 11 weeks where a small group of people, including myself, met together for a meal and a discussion, and then we watched some videos about different aspects of Christianity and then we would have a small group discussion," he explained.

"It was a really good opportunity to talk and experience growth and see what other people's perspectives on certain matters were and connect with other young people about the faith."

Josh joined the group because he was curious and wanted to meet with people who were in a similar stage of life as him.

"It was good to step out and meet new people and grow in that community and bond with others," he said.

"I loved seeing how other people connect to their faith, it allowed me to appreciate my faith more because I could see how broad and diverse the methods that God works within are." He encourages anyone interested to attend an Alpha session.

"What do you have to lose? If you're someone who has a few questions about faith it's a great opportunity to come along and get some answers," he said.

Mary-Anne DeLuca, Mission and Outreach Officer at the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle echoed Josh's sentiments.

"Alpha gives people the opportunity to delve deeper into important questions in life around faith, meaning, and purpose,"

"It is always a privilege to hear about how other people think and what they believe in and to grapple with our own ideas and motivations for believing or not believing, as we contemplate faith and its relevancy and connection to our lives and world today."

She encourages more parishes and communities to get involved with Alpha.

"This is a great opportunity for people to grow and to discover the joy of the gospel," Mary-Anne said.

"I would be so excited to share this with any person or group who may be interested in running the series."
