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SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Year B — Reflection 28th July 2024

As we progress through the Sundays in Ordinary Time, which, as previously mentioned, is anything BUT Ordinary - we are presented with the day-to-day activities in the life of Jesus — His Mission was to go out with His disciples teaching them how to convey His Father's message to the people, who were waiting expectantly for the promised Messiah.

There was no distinction made between Jews & Gentiles - God's redeeming power was attainable by all who heard & believed His words. Maybe you could describe these people who gathered in their thousands as a "captive audience"! Regardless, they patiently followed Him, eager to learn about this Heavenly Father whose message was one of equality, love & mercy to all who believed.

Yes, all the stories are very familiar to us - working miracles, teaching & sometimes even feeding the constant crowds who followed Jesus' movements are the overriding themes during these weeks in Ordinary Time.

Perhaps, as an exercise during these weeks, in order to fully comprehend the amazing power that Jesus possessed & witness His deep concern for the people, maybe we could try to imagine OURSELVES in these crowds, so as to actually FEEL the effects of His words & actions. They were hungry for the knowledge He was giving them & overcome by the miracles He performed, as a result of their faith in Him. We would also witness His deep CONCERN for their physical welfare, which, at times was not so obvious to the disciples! So the crowds who had come to be spiritually fed by Jesus' words had sometimes been physically fed as well.

There is also a similar theme in the other Readings today — The beautiful response to the Psalm echoes our dependence on God's goodness & mercy, "The hand of the Lord feeds us, He answers all our needs"

Paul's Letter to the Ephesians urges his followers to lead a life comparable to their vocation, by acting charitably, selflessly, with gentleness & patience. Quite a task for his disciples to achieve, given their working conditions! So, are we prepared to achieve the same outcome when we encounter similar situations? In our 21st Century world today, there are countless numbers of people, so many needs, so many things to be done that the situations seem impossible. Yet, Jesus only asks that we give Him what we have, little as it may seem. Then He gives thanks for it & quite often we find out that things work out well beyond our imaginings. May we be attentive to these miracles that happen when we realise that we have all we need to make a difference-if we only put our trust in Jesus!

We, His followers, are made up of two parts- body & soul-both requiring nourishment & attention. In the prayer He taught us, He urged us to ask the Father to "give us this day our daily bread" - this bread can refer to Himself, the Bread of Life that we receive in Communion, but it also refers to the food we need for sustenance each day.

The Gospel also reveals Jesus' concern that NONE of the leftover food is wasted, as He urges the disciples to collect all the leftover scraps -"pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted"! Sadly, today, we live in an age of incredible wastefulness— a "throwaway" society, where huge amounts of food are dumped every day.

May we learn to share freely our personal & material gifts with ALL who are in need of them. Since there will never cease to be someone in need on the earth I therefore command you "Open your hand to the poor & needy neighbour in your land". Deuteronomy 15:10-11

"God is our merciful Father & the source of all comfort, He comforts us in all our troubles so that we can comfort others". 2 Cor 1:3-4

Our mission is to evangelise to proclaim Christ, the Good News of God's love for all. All our pastoral activities must, therefore, both flow from our personal response to Christ and be carried out in the spirit of the Gospel.

That in the parish everyone will have the opportunity and formation to make their contribution to the life and mission of the Parish.

This is what Pope Francis said recently about Synodality. 'Synodality is a way of "journeying together" – of living out our faith – that calls for speaking and listening to one another and the Holy Spirit in order to find a path forward in addressing the issues facing the Church in our day as we work to carry out our mission of making known the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ

Did You Know?

Striking of the Breast.

The striking of the breast is a devotional gesture. It is a sign of sorrow for sin, the root of which was thought to be in the heart. This was a gesture familiar among ancient people and is found in the Christian Scriptures, in the parable of the publican.

Sign of the Cross

The Sign of the Cross came into use as a religious gesture of blessing during the Middle Ages. It takes several forms. The big Sign of the Cross is made with the hand, touching first the forehead, then the breast, left shoulder, and finally the right shoulder. While doing it, it is common to add an expression of faith in the Trinity. The little Sign of the Cross is made by tracing a small cross on the forehead, mouth, and breast. In ancient times it was made with one finger only on the forehead

Report From Bishop Michael Kennedy

With the death of Bishop Bill Wright, many initiatives started by Bishop Bill were put on hold, including the Diocesan Synod which commenced in 2019.

When Bishop Michael Kennedy was installed as Bishop of Maitland/Newcastle, he appointed an Implementation Committee to review the Governance of the Diocese.

This review has now concluded with recommendations presented to the bishop. Bishop Michael has now acknowledged the report in the form of a letter to the Diocese.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

At the end of last year, I advised you of a review and changes in two of our important Diocesan teams, Religious Education & Spirituality and Pastoral Ministries. I am pleased to now advise that following regular discussion and discernment over the last several months, the Implementation Committee has provided their final report to me.

Thus, the report contains a number of recommendations that the new Director of Mission & Evangelisation (who leads the Pastoral Ministries Team) and new Head of Religious Education & Spirituality will be tasked with implementing with their teams.

The recommendations also include a review of the Governance relationships and statutes at a Diocesan level, and once reviewed, a reconstituting of the Diocesan Pastoral Council. That Pastoral Council will then be tasked with finalising the Diocesan Synod and developing a Diocesan Pastoral Plan. Work on this will begin soon, and it will take however long is required for us to ensure we achieve the best plans possible for our Diocese.

With the One body. One mission. initiative introduced by Bishop Bill Wright; it was agreed that the best outcomes are achieved when the new leaders can work with their teams in consultative ways to implement the recommendations for change. supporting our Diocese, our clergy, our parishes, our people and those beyond, and defining our path forward as a community of Christ's disciples.

IV World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

'Do not cast me off in my old age' (cfr. Sal 71:9)

This weekend we are celebrating the IV World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. The theme chosen by the Holy Father – "Do not cast me off in my old age" (cf. *Psalm* 71:9) – is meant to call attention to the fact that, sadly, loneliness is the bitter lot in life of many elderly persons, so often the victims of the throw-away culture.

In this year of preparation for the Jubilee, which the Holy Father wishes to be devoted to prayer, the theme of the World Day is taken from Psalm 71, the plea of an elderly person who reflects on the story of his friendship with God.

By cherishing the charisms of grandparents and the elderly, and the contribution they make to the life of the Church, the World Day seeks to support the efforts of every ecclesial community to forge bonds between the generations and to combat loneliness, in the awareness that – as Scripture states – "It is not good for man to be alone" (*Gen* 2:18).

He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

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FAITH MATTERS: Pilgrims on a Journey

The concept of pilgrimage is not a new one, for centuries individuals and groups have travelled to places of significance for numerous reasons.

In the Christian faith tradition pilgrimage was first made to sites connected with the birth, life, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. Early church fathers like Saint Jermone encouraged the faithful to be pilgrims and Constantine the Great's mother Saint Helena is said to have established the concept.

Saint Helena, also known as Helena Augusta or Helena of Constantinople, is renowned for her role in promoting Christianity and her pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Helena was likely born around 250 AD in Drepanum (modern-day Turkey). She married the Roman Emperor Constantius Chlorus, and their son was Constantine the Great. Helena converted to Christianity later in life, possibly influenced by her son Constantine and in 326 AD undertook pilgrimage to the Holy Lands. She travelled to Jerusalem and Bethlehem, seeking out the sites associated with Jesus Christ's life and ministry.

During her pilgrimage, Helena is traditionally credited with several important discoveries. According to tradition, Helena discovered the True Cross (the cross on which Jesus was crucified) buried beneath the site of the crucifixion in Jerusalem. Helena also identified and helped build the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, commemorating the sites of Jesus' crucifixion, burial, and resurrection. Helena's influence extended beyond her pilgrimage.

She supported the Christian community in various ways, including the construction of churches and the promotion of Christian practices. Over the many years the concept of pilgrimage has expanded to not only encompass the significance of the destination but also the journey along the way.

The purpose of Christian pilgrimage was summarised by Pope Benedict XVI in this way:

'To go on pilgrimage is not simply to visit a place to admire its treasures of nature, art or history. To go on pilgrimage really means to step out of ourselves in order to encounter God where he has revealed himself, where his grace has shone with particular splendour and produced rich fruits of conversion and holiness among those who believe.'

Pope Francis said, "Pilgrimage is not the same as a Vacation... Making a Pilgrimage to shrines is one of the most eloquent expressions of the faith of God's people... It would be a mistake to think that those who go on a pilgrimage live a spirituality that is not personal but rather of the masses. The reality is that the pilgrim carries within him his own history and faith and the lights and shadows of his own life. Each person carries within his or her heart a special wish and a particular prayer. Those who enter the

shrine immediately feel they are at home, welcomed, understood, and supported."

As we journey towards 2025 and the Jubilee year of 'Pilgrims of Hope' Pope Francis writes,

'Pilgrimage is of course a fundamental element of every Jubilee event. Setting out on a journey is traditionally associated with our human quest for meaning in life. A pilgrimage on foot is a great aid for rediscovering the value of silence, effort and simplicity of life.'

A pilgrimage can be challenging, it takes us out of our comfort zone as God is revealed to us through this transformational experience. Revelation occurs not only necessarily at the places we visit but also in those that we encounter and stories that are shared on the journey.

Over the coming months we pray for those who are journeying on the Diocesan aMeN caMiNo and the pilgrimage to Ireland.

On 17 August, we invite you to sample the aMeN caMiNo experience through a Community Walk and 7 & 8 September you are invited to the aMeN caMiNo weekend experience during this year's Season of Creation at the beautiful Myall Coast. All Saints' College Maitland student Leo Dyre, 15 plays the guitar and has been helping his sister Lily, 14 practice her singing for the show.

"It's great, we get to talk about our rehearsals after we do them and even practice together," Leo said.

"While he plays guitar, I start singing. We'll do it with a backing track, and then he'll play his part along with the backing track, and I'll just sing my part," Lily said.

This year's production is called Disconnected, which follows a story about a town crier who has been fired and find that nobody cares as they're all too consumed by their phone screens, until the internet is mysteriously cut off.

Truth and Peace

In 1963, the world was on the brink of nuclear war. It was at that time that Pope St. John XXIII issued his ground breaking encyclical letter, Pacem in Terris (Peace on Earth). It was a heartfelt plea to the Church and all people of goodwill for an end to war and for the banning of nuclear weapons. He promoted a peace which is grounded in the inalienable and inviolable dignity of every person. His successors up to the present have echoed the same impassioned plea.

In the 2024 – 2025 Social Justice Statement, "Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World", Australia's Bishops scrutinise the signs of our own troubled times, observe the violence around us, and ask why it is so. They also ask what is needed if there is to be peace.

In a world full of pessimism, they put their faith and hope in the possibility of peace.

Using scripture and the guidance of Pope St. John XXIII's Pacem in Terris and Pope Francis' Fratelli Tutti, we learn that peace is possible if we put our trust in Christ who is the way, the truth and the life and the Prince of Peace. It is from him that we learn about the architecture of peace. From him, we learn a commitment to the culture of encounter, the value of dialogue at all levels and the importance of seeing everyone as our sister, our brother.

The statement also provides some suggested actions to help us to build on our commitment to be peacemakers locally and internationally.

The Statement will be launched on Tuesday 20 August.
