



THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B 03 NOVEMBER 2024

Todays scripture readings remind us of one of the greatest truths in the Bible, that there are really only two commandments. The first is to love God, and the second is to love our neighbour.

The Scribe's question as to which commandment was the greatest, was one frequently discussed among the rabbis. Jesus was asked to name one, but responded by naming two.

Although the laws are numbered "first" and "second," they are, in truth, only one. The Scribe fully agreed with Jesus, and went on to declare that true love of God and the loving service of others are more important than elaborate practices.

Jesus' answer to the question from the Scribe, also reaches out to ask us, where we stand today. Are we content with fulfilling our weekly obligation, to gather and worship God, and celebrate God's goodness? Or will we carry over that celebration into the rest of the week.

If only loving God and our neighbour was easy!

GOSPEL

Mark 12:28-34

This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Year B — Reflection 3rd November 2024

Today's Scripture readings remind us of one of the greatest truths in the Bible, namely there are only two commandments. The first is love of God, and the second is love of neighbour. By rabbinical count,' the Law' at the time of Jesus, consisted of some 613 commandments.

The Scribe's (Canon Lawyer) question to Jesus, as to which commandment was the greatest, was one that was frequently discussed among the rabbis at that time. What Jesus did in response was to put the two together, thus emphasizing the essential relatedness of them. This emphasis on love, became for Christians, the characteristic of the Christian religion.

On Friday and Saturday, the Feast of All Saints and All Souls set the tone for November, as a time to remember those who have gone before us. Our concern for the deceased should be matched by our concern for the living. It is not enough for us to worship God, if we do not embrace our neighbours. Reverence and hospitality in worship should not be in conflict; both are essential for true Christian worship. According to the Bible a religion in conflict is a distortion.

As we come to the end of the church year, now is a good time to take stock of our lives. In every moment, we are given a choice. Are there places we have strayed from the essential core of Jesus' message? Do my actions and my very being communicate reverence for God and reverence for neighbour?

When they do, like the scribe in today's Gospel, we are not far from the kingdom of God.

Resumption of Communion from the chalice Message from Bishop Michael Kennedy 23 October 2024 Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Having received advice from the Diocesan Liturgical Council and discussed the matter extensively with the Council of Priests at several meetings I am allowing the resumption of Communion from the Chalice from the First Sunday of Advent, 1 December 2024.

Here, I call attention to a few considerations.

Whilst receiving Holy Communion under both kinds is a fuller sign, a person who chooses to receive only the Host, still receives Christ whole and entire.

A person with symptoms of cold, flu, Covid, or other virus should not share the chalice with others.

Each parish should undertake its own discernment of whether and when to implement this resumption.

Given the practical considerations it is therefore of the utmost importance for parishes to undertake proper discernment about this.

A few points for our parish to consider are:

- 1 Are appropriate sanitising protocols in place.
- 2 Are metal Chalices available for use.
- 3 Do we have sufficient formed Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to offer the Chalice at each Mass
- 4 Do we have enough formed Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion willing to consume the Precious Blood remaining after Communion at each Mass.

Month of the Holy Souls

One of the most ancient customs related to respect for the dead is to visit graves, place flowers on them, and pray there in memory of loved ones. This has continued throughout the centuries. During pre-Christian times, it was common for pagans to celebrate rituals related to their dead at the end of the harvest. These customs influenced Christians to do the same. The month of November has traditionally been dedicated to those who have died.

Black was considered one of the five liturgical colours in the 13th century. It was associated in the western world with the theme of death and mourning and was used for funerals and Masses for the dead until recent times. It is not used today, however. Emphasis today is on the positive and joyful theme of resurrection for funerals. The colour white is symbolic for this theme and is now used universally for funerals.

Be open to the rollercoaster

Twenty-five lives in 15 years.

That's how many children have known love and stability thanks to CatholicCare Hunter-Manning foster carer Megan Powell.

From respite care through to guardianship/permanent care, Megan has welcomed children from all backgrounds to help them move forward and grow.

When it comes to why she got into foster care, the answer is simple.

"I had a lot of love to give and felt that I could shower that love on vulnerable children when they need it most," she said.

"These children have done nothing wrong; it is not their fault, they did not choose this pathway. They deserve support to become happy and healthy and go on to bigger and better things.

"It's an honour to help them and show them love."

For Megan, her journey as a carer has been full of ups and downs.

"Saying goodbye to the children is really difficult, and it is 100% the reason that most people say 'I could never do it'," she said.

"But the reality is somebody has to, and I've always maintained that I am stronger than they are so I can absorb it.

"There is no doubt that I grieve every single one of them, but I'm a big part of their life, and that outweighs it.

"I've helped set them up for a lifetime of happiness and given them the ability to bond and attach to someone and have a chance at a good life.

"I am very proud of that."

Over the 15 years, Megan has experienced many highlights, but nothing was more special than being awarded guardianship over her two sons – Noah* and Riley*.

In 2016, she decided to pursue becoming their legal guardian after caring for them since they were babies.

It took three and half years, but with the support of both boys' birth families, Megan was eventually granted guardianship and now has three children – her sons Noah and Riley and her biological daughter Lara*.

"It was a long journey, but it was certainly worth it. I love them both so much," she said.

Now, as an emergency carer, Megan looks after newborn babies who have no one else to turn to.

She takes care of these children until their birth families are strong enough to welcome them back home.

"I have looked after some babies who have had a very traumatic start to life, so I do believe that I've played a part in saving their life and giving them a chance," Megan said.

At the time of writing, Megan was caring for seven-month-old William* and had not long said goodbye to six-month-old Daisy*. "It's an emotional rollercoaster, but you have to be open to the wonder of foster care. The ride is definitely worth it," she said.

Early last month, Megan was recognised for her incredible work when she was nominated and became a finalist for Emergency Carer of the Year at the My Forever Family NSW Carer Recognition Awards.

She was both shocked and honoured by the nomination.

"It's very kind. It's nice to be recognised for what I've done, and will continue to do, for children in need," she said.

"I am very passionate about child protection and will continue on this pathway for as long as I can."

Megan encourages anyone thinking about becoming a foster carer to do their research and start slow with respite care.

"I've always believed people should start with respite care," she explained.

"Sometimes people go into it thinking that loving a child is enough, but that is just not the case.

"It's fantastic that you do love the children, but it's not enough because there's much more involved.

"These children often come from traumatic backgrounds and will need a lot of support to settle in.

"You have to be open to being part of a team, to be open to embracing birth family, and be willing to bring someone new, not only into your life but your whole family's lives.

"It will impact every single part of your family, so you need to make sure everyone is ready for it.

"It is life-changing and a roller coaster of ups and downs, but it is absolutely worth it." $\label{eq:coaster}$

Since becoming a foster carer, Megan has been with CatholicCare Social Services Hunter-Manning. She says the agency is a great support and that she has had so many wonderful caseworkers over the years.
