Dear Parish Family,

Happy New Year! I hope everyone has had a great start to the New Year. I have always loved the excitement of New Years and having lived in Sydney for the past few years, I got to see those amazing fireworks from our hospital building. New Years always has those signs of hope, as we enter a new year...this year is special with the Year of Jubilee with the theme of Hope!



In my office at the hospital (and now at home) hangs this picture. During my tough days in chaplaincy and then the darkest days of COVID, it reminded me of the great gift of hope. It was also the image behind me when I was meeting online for others to see. For me hope means things always get better because God has our back. What does hope mean for you? For your families? For our communities? For our world? Pope Francis writes "HOPE encourages us to look outside ourselves, to embrace authentic beauty, change attitudes that exclude others, overcome life's challenges with courage, and trust that joy and hope are still possible, even in challenging times." This Sunday in our parishes, we will begin celebrating with our universal family of the Church with the lighting of the Paschal Candle, the sign of hope. It will be lit every time we meet for Mass and prayers as a sign of the Jubilee year and will replace the cribs. Again, we will continue to unfold this theme in the coming weeks and months ahead.

This weekend as we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, we recall the journey of the Magi, also referred to as the three kings. They represent another culture, another group outside of the Jewish tradition, perhaps the unwanted but they also represent us who go in search for answers, in search for hope, truth and meaning. It is a reminder that Christmas isn't just about looking upon the birth of the Christ child but also calling for a response to this birth. The Magi, led by a star, find the child who is there not just for some, but for everyone. Having encountered the gift of this Child, they return home a different way because nothing can ever be the same again....and as they turn for home, they leave the Child, but the Child will never leave them. That is the meaning of Epiphany.

This weekend we welcome Fr Paul Kamau CSSP to our parishes. I am sure you will give him a very warm welcome, as you have welcomed me into the parishes. This week marked the changing of the guard with Fr Greg now in the inner-city parishes of St Benedict's and John and Uta, our parish Lay Leaders in Morisset, stepping aside, as I take up my new appointment as your Parish Priest. I am blessed to be able to continue to build on the foundation of my predecessors and work alongside Uta and John into the future. It is an exciting time and a new era for us all.

Welcome

Welcome to all the visitors to our Parish of St john Vianney during the summer holiday season.

The Parish of St John Vianney Morisset, was officially formed in 1947, however our Mass center of St Patrick and St Brigid at Cooranbong, dates to the 1860's. The present Cooranbong Church celebrated its centenary in August 2006, and 150 years of Catholic presence in the area was celebrated in 2011.

It is documented that Saint Mary McKillop visited Cooranbong where she had a convent school. Up until 1966 St John Vianney Parish was part of the Diocese of Sydney, but now it is part of the Diocese of Maitland / Newcastle, with Bishop Michael Kennedy as Bishop.

The 9.30am Mass at Morisset is recorded each Sunday and uploaded to the Parish Website and Facebook later in the day, internet allowing. This allows people in nursing facilities and those away from the parish for whatever reason, to keep 'in touch' with the parish.

GOSPEL

Matthew 2:1-12

We have come from the East to worship the king.

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him, 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

The Epiphany Year C - 5th January 2025 Reflection

Pope Francis has proclaimed this year, 2025, a Jubilee (Holy Year). For our troubled world, this is so important. The Pope writes, "The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire: that is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, Pilgrims of Hope." Let us all begin our hope-filled pilgrimage together and continue it throughout this year.

This weekend, this wonderful feast of the Epiphany, is a great way to begin our pilgrimage, because we are celebrating the revelation of Christ, the long-awaited Messiah, to all human kind. Matthew's Gospel holds the key for us: Jesus is not only the Messiah of Israel, but the Saviour of the whole world.

This is the only Gospel that records the visit of the Magi, the

three wise men seeking to pay homage to the infant King of the Jews. "Magi" was the name given to the Persian priestly caste. They were possibly astronomers and astrologers, who saw a special significance in the appearance of this star. As educated men, they would have been aware of Jewish expectations and so they followed where it led. In their pilgrimage we see the fulfillment of the prophecies of Isaiah: "The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness..bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord."

Matthew wanted to emphasise the Kingship of Jesus so it is appropriate that dignitaries from a foreign land should bring gifts to acknowledge the birth of a king. The gifts they brought were symbolic of Christ's destiny: gold representing kingship; frankincense, an aromatic incense, expressing the mystery of his divinity; and myrrh, a bitter incense from a small thorny tree, foretelling the pain and suffering that he is to endure for our sake.

It is especially significant that these first worshippers were non-Jewish and of a different faith. The homage they pay the Christ child provides a stark contrast to the duplicity and hostility of Herod and to the rejection of Christ by so many of the Jews. This is a key focus of Matthew's Gospel, that Jesus was accepted by the Gentiles but not his own people.

Amazingly, through faith, these wise men were able to recognise in this infant, born in such humble circumstances, what they were seeking. Let us pray that we, also, may recognise what we seek in this wonderous birth.

In his letter to the Ephesians Paul speaks of the "mystery" that has now been revealed. In Christ, Jews and Gentiles alike have been made the inheritors of His Kingdom. Paul says, "The pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus, through the Gospel."

These scriptures leave us with two questions:

- The Magi had the star, but what signs do we have to show us the way?
- What gifts can we bring to do homage to our Lord?

Christ's teachings, recorded in the Scriptures, are a sure guide for us to follow in the way we live our lives. The greatest gift we can give is the gift of ourselves as we seek to follow his command: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all you soul and with all your mind. This is the first and most important of the commandments. But there is another one like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself." (Matt 22:37-39) Whenever we do an act of kindness to someone in need, whenever we reach out to someone who is sick or lonely, we are giving a gift to our Lord.

We have Christ's promise, so we live in hope! Pam Melvey

Caritas Australia launches a Vanuatu earthquake appeal

At least 14 people have been killed in Vanuatu following two earthquakes in 24 hours, impacting an estimated 116,000 people.

Hundreds of people are injured or trapped following the collapse of buildings resulting from successive 7.4 and 6.1 magnitude earthquakes. As rescue efforts continue, the death toll is expected to rise. The Port Vila hospital has been overwhelmed, having also sustained damage resulting in the closure of operating theatres.

Two major water reserves that supply Port Vila have also been destroyed, with assessment into water supplies ongoing. Major damage to infrastructure has been sustained, impacting communications, airport runways, bridges including the Tagabe, Teouma and Black Sand bridges, and the main port.

As part of the Church Agencies Network Disaster Operations (CANDO) Caritas Australia will be supporting on the ground through its partners. These partners are assessing the situation, and are ready to respond to the humanitarian requirements, which are likely to include emergency shelter, food, and other essentials, as well as psychosocial support.

Sally Thomas, Humanitarian Manager at Caritas Australia said, "Vanuatu, and particularly Port Vila, has been devastated. People are now trying to recover and perform rescues with damage to infrastructure such as bridges, telecommunications, water supplies, and the local hospital."

"Many are fearing further disaster as Vanuatu is one of the most susceptible countries to natural disasters such as earthquakes, storm damage, flooding, and tsunamis. These disasters are unfortunately the most common place at this time of year, when many of us are celebrating and enjoying a break."

"As we embrace the festivities, we must remember that our brothers and sisters in Vanuatu, who need our compassion and support as they recover."



EDUCATING FOR PEACE

(page 10 Truth & Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World 2024-2025 Social Justice Statement)

Peace does not just happen or fall from the sky. Its fulness may be God's gift, but on the way to that fulness, peace-making can and must be taught and learnt. Therefore, education is vital for building a culture of peace, teaching the art and "architecture of peace", how to shape a culture of dialogue based on encounter. Teaching and education are, says Pope Francis, "the primary means of promoting integral human development; and they are essential for the defence and promotion of peace. In a word, teaching and education are the foundations of a cohesive civil society".22 Recently the Pope gathered 6,000 children from the Italian Network of Schools of Peace at the Vatican and encouraged them to be "artisans of peace", not war-mongers but peace-mongers, urging them be active in promoting their dream of a new vision for the world. The Network is committed to educating the young people of Italy about peace, justice, human rights, citizenship and responsibility, and it may have something to offer here in Australia.23 Promoting cohesion has been a strength of Catholic education in Australia for over 200 years, and our schools provide a unique opportunity for the teaching of peace and educating in what "the architecture of peace" requires. Given the urgency of the task, it is worth asking, how might our schools be more focused and creative in teaching the way of truth, trust and peace? No doubt this is already happening in the schools in many ways, direct and indirect; but as the world grows more violent, might still more be done? This is a question for our educational leaders.
