Today's Gospel gives us a timely message about the end of the world.

Many people have claimed to know when the end of the world will come. Some claim a special revelation from God, others claim to have calculated it from the Bible.

All such claims should be ignored.

Jesus tells us that no one knows when the end will come except the heavenly Father. Therefore, the disciples must not allow themselves to be misled by claims or speculations that the end is near, but must maintain a constant watchfulness

THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Year B — Reflection 17th November 2024

As we come to the end of this Liturgical Year, & the approach of Advent, the readings increasingly refer to the "end times" or to what Theologians call "Eschatology" - a term which describes the meaning of the end times —it captures the full spectrum of our Christian hope for the fulfilment of God's promises -not only in our present time but in the age to come.

During the various stages of our lives, all of us will experience the end of many things, such as relationships, life styles, jobs & possible relocation to another town, state or even country. In a similar way, each year has an ending, whether it be a calendar, tax, financial or Liturgical Year.

The reality is that new things cannot begin unless something ends first.

Each moment is a critical moment, it will not come again. As for how long the end time will last, that is God's prerogative - it is not for us to know or speculate . We don't have to wonder if the Lord will appear as He promised—only when?

One day, our world will surely come to an end —it will be transformed by the Lord's coming. Do we see this event as a promise or a threat?

Both the 1st Reading from the prophet Daniel & Mark's Gospel are written in the style known as Apocalyptic, which is highly symbolic & uses colourful images to paint a picture of stressful times.

Daniel's account arises in times of persecution & disorder & its purpose is to encourage the people NOT to lose their nerve -no matter how bad things may seem, the ultimate victory belongs to God & His people. It was a time of severe distress for him -it occurred during the terrible persecution of loyal Jews under the Greek Empire & for the first time in Hebrew thought, God's victory is seen in terms of resurrection—those who have suffered for the faith will rise to everlasting life— however, it was coming back to life but in a total transformation— they will shine "as bright as the stars".

The words of the Psalm express the peoples' complete trust in God, while the antiphon expresses a direct hopeful plea for safety.

The final reading for the year from the letter to the Hebrews is a summary of the changes that have occurred since Jesus' coming amongst them- His work amongst them had been completed once & for all.

Mark's Gospel has two themes- the coming of Christ & the nearness & certainty of that coming, accompanied by a detailed description of what signs will appear.

At Jesus' trial later on, He will tell the Sanhedrin "You will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power & coming in the clouds of heaven". Mk14:62

The coming of Christ begins with the resurrection. As the Gospel is preached down the ages & His chosen ones stand up in all parts of the world, His victory is being revealed. The parable of the fig tree serves as a call for us to read the signs of the times even in our generation God's victory is being worked out- if we have the eyes to see.

Although we may not experience this apocalyptic event of the end of the world, we can & will experience times when our personal worlds seem to be crashing around us. It is possible that these times of trials can also be times of grace in which we truly feel God's presence uplifting & reassuring us.

Did you know?

The Holy Father has proclaimed that 2025 will be a year of Jubilee. The Theme is 'Pilgrims of Hope'. The 2025 Jubilee will officially open on December 24, 2024, at 7pm with a Mass presided over by Pope Francis in St. Peter's Square, and concludes on 6 January 2026. Pope Francis has invited Catholics to renew our hope and discover a vision that can "restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone". We are also invited to rediscover a spirituality of God's creation in which we understand ourselves as "pilgrims on the earth" rather than masters of the world.

Chancery News

Letter from Bishop Michael Kennedy.

Last week Bishop Michael Kennedy sent a communique to Parish Priests and Parish Leaders. An extract is included for your perusal.

Having now completed eighteen months in the Diocese I have experienced a full cycle of the liturgical year and celebrated Mass with every parish and in almost every stational church.

You will have noticed the importance I place on well-celebrated liturgy. You have also heard me speak about the need for us to live as a missionary and evangelising community. The liturgy, in fact, is central to our life and mission.

I have noticed a few areas that I hope we can focus on together to grow a parish and diocesan culture that is strong in both the ministries of evangelisation and initiation. It is my hope that together we can commit our energies to igniting a passion for these ministries amongst all the faithful.

I sense this is a moment, a ripe time in our life as a diocese, to focus on growing a parish and diocesan culture strong in both the ministries of Evangelisation and Initiation. We can't afford to do nothing. Think for a moment what parish life will be like in five years if we keep on doing what we've always done with no change.

Resumption of Communion from the Chalice at Mass

Recently Bishop Michael Kennedy sent a Communique to Parishes to discern the resumption of receiving from the chalice at Mass.

It said:

Having received advice from the Diocesan Liturgical Council and discussed the matter extensively with the Council of Priests at

several meetings I am allowing the resumption of Communion from the Chalice from the First Sunday of Advent, 1 December 2024.

Here, I call attention to a few considerations.

Whilst receiving Holy Communion under both kinds is a fuller sign, a person who chooses to receive only the Host, still receives Christ whole and entire.

A person with symptoms of cold, flu, Covid, or other virus should not share the chalice with others.

Each parish should undertake its own discernment of whether and when to implement this resumption.

Given the practical considerations it is therefore of the utmost importance for parishes to undertake proper discernment about this.

A few points for our parish to consider before this is reintroduced

- 1 Are appropriate sanitising protocols in place.
- 2 Are metal Chalices available for use.
- 3 Do we have sufficient formed Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to offer the Chalice at each Mass
- 4 Do we have enough formed Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion willing to consume the Precious Blood remaining after Communion at each Mass.

Over the last couple of Sundays parishioners have been made aware of this advice from the Bishop, through the Parish Bulletin, and at Mass.

Last weekend a 'headcount' was taken at both the Cooranbong and Morisset Mass. to ascertain parishioners feelings toward the reintroduction of Communion from the Chalice at Mass in our parish.

A total of four people voted for the chalice to be reintroduced. With this number of parishioners in favour of the reintroduction of the chalice, it is prudent that the 'Status Quo' remain, and the existing practice of receiving Holy Communion will continue.

Being able to focus on prayer in 2024 as Pope Francis asked the faithful has presented the perfect opportunity to spiritually prepare ourselves for the 2025 celebrations. One group from Jesus, The Good Shepherd, Parish Belmont have been meeting on a regular basis to reflect on the Sunday Gospel. Parishioner Jan Allen had a burning desire to engage the community in faith formation and initiated the invitation for a monthly gathering. As a result, a constant, yet fluid group have been meeting for the best part of the year.

It has been a privilege to be invited into the space of prayer and reflection as the mystery of God is revealed through scripture, an encounter with each other and our experience with the wider world.

This month the group reflected on the Gospel of Mark 12:28-34, The Greatest Commandment. The scripture speaks of when one of the teachers of the law questions Jesus about what is the most important commandment. Jesus being a faithful Jew states loving only one God then adds another commandment, love your neighbour as yourself!

As part of the prayerful process of Mystagogical reflection we turn our focus to what captures our attention, what is God revealing to us, why does it matter now and how will we live differently because of what we have heard. I am continuously amazed by the wisdom and richness that occurs when we apply the scripture to our own life. While is it important to consider the world behind the text, the world within the text, it is the world in front of the text and what we experience in the here and now that puts our faith into action.

Through sharing experiences of loving our neighbour we all developed a deeper understanding and appreciation of what it means to give and receive love. Despite this, questions did emerge about the epidemic of loneliness and challenges within contemporary society. My thoughts turned to Pope Francis' fourth encyclical, dedicated to the Heart of Jesus Christ: Dilexit Nos "He Loved Us" which was only released on October 24, 2024. The central idea of this encyclical is that the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ is not just an intimate, personal experience but the

deep source that drives us to love others, change society, and build peace through dialogue and respect for others.

So how can we show love to our neighbour, so our faith speaks louder than words?

The insight I gained from the prayer group was sometimes it is the little things that can make a big difference. Inviting a stranger to dinner, a warm greeting as you pass someone by, assisting with fundraising for those in need, talking to people when you take your dog for a walk, popping up from weeding your garden to say hello to a new mum pushing a pram, reaching out to the lonely and isolated. Ultimately treating all with dignity, respect and overall love, the same love that Jesus showed all he encountered and the love he shows us.

As we prepare to be pilgrims of hope there is much, we can learn from Pope Francis' latest writings and reflecting on scripture with each other.
