




SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT YEAR C 08 DECEMBER 2024

GOSPEL

Luke 21:25-28. 34-36

Your redemption is near at hand.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world, for the powers of heaven will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand.

'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life, and that day will be sprung on you suddenly, like a trap. For it will come down on every living man on the face of the earth. Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.'

Second Sunday of Advent Year C - 8th December 2024 Reflection

On this second Sunday of Advent there is certainly a sense of expectancy in the air. But just what is it that we are expecting? The children certainly are anticipating a visit from Santa; the adults, festive gatherings of family and friends with plenty of food and drink; the shopkeepers, a bonanza of spending. Then there are those who have lost a loved one or are estranged from family or homeless; they are expecting only sadness and loneliness.

However, as followers of Christ, we need to open our minds and hearts beyond all of this, to ponder what the season of Advent is really about. We are waiting, in hopeful anticipation, of the celebration, once again, of the birth the child in Bethlehem. This was the beginning of the fulfilment of all the promises of old, of a Messiah, who would ensure the salvation of his people. The circumstances of his birth were certainly an indication that this

Messiah was to be rather different from the Jewish expectations of a warrior king.

As we wait, Luke's Gospel is significant for us in that it speaks of one, John the Baptist, who, from the very beginning, had a very important role to play. When Mary, pregnant with the child Jesus, went to visit her cousin Elizabeth "the child in her womb leapt for joy." This was the child of Elizabeth's old age, a miraculous child, promised by God to Zechariah. At the child's presentation in the temple on the eighth day after his birth, Zechariah proclaims "you, my child, shall be called prophet of the Most High, for you shall go before the Lord to prepare the way for him and to enable his people to know of their salvation when he comes to forgive their sins."

Like John the Baptist, we have a role to fulfil in preparing the way of the Lord. How can we do this in our secular society, where Christmas is so commercialised?

Firstly, as individuals, we can each look into our hearts and minds to examine those things that are hindering our closer relationship with God. Are we too proud of our own achievements, failing to acknowledge God's gifts to us? Are we too caught up in our acquisitions or worries to allow God His rightful place our lives? Do we fail to forgive hurts done to us?

We can look at the way we live our lives. Would people, seeing us, see people who are living as Christ asks us to: loving God, loving our neighbour, helping those who are in need? Perhaps there are changes we need to make? One thing we can do is that we can talk with our children and grandchildren, sharing with them the true meaning of Christmas.

Every time we pray the prayer Christ taught us, we say: "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven." With the birth of Christ, the process of the establishment of the Kingdom on Earth began and was fulfilled in his teaching, his suffering and death on the Cross and then his glorious resurrection.

We have reason to celebrate! However, the continuation of the Kingdom of peace, love and goodwill is now up to us, so let us do our best, in this Advent season, to properly prepare the way of the Lord and also await His second coming.

Points to Ponder

Traditions have always been an important dimension of celebrating faith. Each age is a time of special grace, including our age of high technology.

Did You Know?

Why is Advent important?

Advent means arrival in Latin. Therefore, it is seen as a time of expectant hope, waiting and preparation, for the arrival of Jesus Christ, the longed-for Messiah and King, at Christmas for Christians around the world. For some it is a time of 'getting right' with people, family and friends, and healing brokenness to get the heart ready for hope, peace, love, and joy.

How many days does Advent go for?

As Advent is reliant on the day of the week that Christmas Day (25 December) lands on each year, it will depend on that. So, it can be 24 days (as it is this year) to 28 days (as it was last year). Why is the colour purple significant during Advent?

Colours have always played an important part in the liturgical life of the church. Whilst for most of the world the customary Christmas colours are red and green, purple is used by the Church. It can represent repentance and penance, but for Advent it can also represent joyful hope.

as Gaudete (rejoice in Latin) Sunday, it represents joy, calling us to rejoice, as the time to celebrate the birth of Jesus is coming soon.

Why are Christmas Carols such a big thing at Christmas?

Who doesn't love to sing! Carols were originally sung to celebrate the four seasons. Christianity repurposed them for Christmas to help bring people into reflective times of devotion (for me it's O Holy Night) and times of celebration (think Hark, the Herald Angels), in the lead up to Christmas. It remains to this day a wonderful, generational gathering, to sing joy into the world.

Message from Bishop Michael Kennedy. New priests coming to the Diocese in 2025

Throughout this year the Vicars General and I have been in communication and negotiations with the Oceania Province of the Congregation of the Holy Spirit and with the Archdiocese of Capiz in the Philippines, both of whom have agreed to send us two priests each on loan. Their arrival dates will depend on visa applications. The first of the Spiritans, Fr Paul Macharia Kamau, has already been in Australia for 12 months so will join us in January. Fr Paul is from Kenya and is currently Associate Pastor at St Francis Xavier Parish Goodna in the Archdiocese of Brisbane.

2025 Clergy Appointments

There are several appointments for 2025 which I have just recently made or of which you have not yet been informed.

Fr Solomon Okovido: Assistant Priest in the parishes of Cessnock and Kurri Kurri. The appointment will take effect in February after he returns from a visit to family and friends in his home country of Nigeria.

Fr Joyce Sebastian: Parish Priest of Myall Coast in addition to his appointment as Parish Priest of Raymond Terrace.

Fr Peter Thoai: Assistant Priest in the parishes of Raymond Terrace and Myall Coast.

Fr Paul Macharia Kamau CSSp: Assistant Priest in the parishes of Boolaroo, Booragul, Toronto, and Morisset.

Fr Priyantha Fernando: I am appointing Fr Priyantha to the new position of Priest Chaplain to St Bede's, St Aloysius, and Our Lady of Lourdes, all in the Chisolm region. He will continue to reside at East Maitland and assist in the parish on weekends.

I wish them all well in their new appointments and thank them for their cooperation.

Lebanon Crisis Appeal

The escalating conflict between Israel and Hezbollah has pushed Lebanon into severe turmoil, with tragic consequences that have spread from Southern Lebanon to the entire nation. The situation is dire: over 3,000 lives have been lost, more than 13,000 people injured, and critical infrastructure has been destroyed.



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10 Questions about Advent

In our latest edition of 10 Questions, Fiona Duque explores Advent and why it is such an important time of year.

What is Advent?

For most Christian churches, the Advent season begins on the Sunday four weeks before Christmas Day. As the day of the week that we celebrate Christmas changes, Advent may therefore start at the end of November or at the beginning of December. This year it starts on the first of December.

Fun fact: This is also the date for the Catholic Church's New 'Liturgical' Year.

Why is Advent important?

Advent means arrival in Latin. Therefore, it is seen as a time of expectant hope, waiting and preparation, for the arrival of Jesus

Christ, the longed-for Messiah and King, at Christmas for Christians around the world. For some it is a time of 'getting right' with people, family and friends, and healing brokenness to get the heart ready for hope, peace, love, and joy.

How many days does Advent go for?

As Advent is reliant on the day of the week that Christmas Day (25 December) lands on each year, it will depend on that. So, it can be 24 days (as it is this year) to 28 days (as it was last year).

Why is the colour purple significant during Advent?

Colours have always played an important part in the liturgical life of the church. Whilst for most of the world the customary Christmas colours are red and green, purple is used by the Church. It can represent repentance and penance, but for Advent it can also represent joyful hope.

What is the significance of the Advent wreath?

Advent Wreaths are a popular devotion. They have four candles within a circle of greenery and have become a symbol of Christmas preparations in many places, including our homes, workplaces and shopping centres. However, its main purpose is to light a candle each Sunday to recall the various stages of salvation history prior to Christ's coming.

Why does one Advent candle have a different colour?

Whilst three of the four candles are purple, in keeping with the Advent season, the third Sunday's candle is rose/pink coloured. Sometimes known as Gaudete (rejoice in Latin) Sunday, it represents joy, calling us to rejoice, as the time to celebrate the birth of Jesus is coming soon.

Why are Christmas Carols such a big thing at Christmas?

Who doesn't love to sing! Carols were originally sung to celebrate the four seasons. Christianity repurposed them for Christmas to help bring people into reflective times of devotion (for me it's O Holy Night) and times of celebration (think Hark, the Herald Angels), in the lead up to Christmas. It remains to this day a wonderful, generational gathering, to sing joy into the world.

Why are Nativity Scenes a popular custom during Advent?

Nativity scenes show Jesus' humble birth. It resonates with people, especially children. It is a reminder of God's love for humanity where He chose to become a part of our history. It reflects the Gospel messages of birth, life, death and resurrection that Jesus' birth brings. It also universally reflects love, peace, and humility. These values make its popularity extend beyond the Christian community, making it a global symbol of the season.

What's all the fuss about Santa Clause, or should I say St Nicholas?

Grounded in tradition and culture, you won't, however, normally see Santa at Mass. Santa Clause isn't a world-wide tradition, nor does every country call the character Santa Clause. Legend has it that the original Santa was a monk (or bishop) of Myra, now situated in modern day Türkiye, called Saint (Santa) Nicholas (Clause), and was generous person. St. Nicholas was canonized in 1446, and known as the patron saint for children and sailors.

I am not Catholic; how can I get involved with Advent?

You don't have to be Catholic to get involved. Chances are you already have been getting involved. You just didn't realise. You could set up an Advent wreath in your home, invest in a nativity scene, use an Advent calendar to count down the days (I recommend the ones with chocolate) or go do some carolling. Maybe head to Church and see it decked out in its purple finery. Reflect on how you can bring love, peace and humility to those you meet, especially at this time where many find themselves in difficult times.

This time last year I wrote an article that focussed on 'The Holy Family: Refugees and Immigrants'. This year, we continue to see a broken world in desperate need of healing. Advent has a twofold character, for it is a time of preparation for the Solemnities of Christmas, in which the First Coming of the Son of God to humanity is remembered, and likewise a time when, by remembrance of this, minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. For these two reasons, Advent is a period of devout and expectant delight (n. 39)

So, as we journey through this Advent season, and we begin to gather gifts for our families and friends, let us start making purchases that bring a difference in more than one person's life. Give a gift that gives twice so that at this time of hope, peace, joy and love we can give others the gift of expectant delight.
